2022 Emerson YRBS Methodology

- Data collected in March/April 2022
- Administered entirely online
- Student participation is confidential
- 77% of students participated

Overall Summary of Findings

As students mature, they show a tendency to engage in more risky behaviors and have lower levels of parental involvement.

- ▶ 6th grade are more likely to struggle with:
 - > Self-harm
 - ➤ Being bullied at school
- **→** However, 6th graders also report:
 - Greater trust in teachers to stop bullying
 - More sleep at night
 - ➤ More parental oversight



- Older students engage more in risky behaviors:
 - Sexual harassment
 - Sexual messaging, sexual intercourse, and pornography
 - Alcohol, e-cigarette, and marijuana use
 - Depression
 - Suicide consideration
- > They also have higher stress from academics, COVID-19, and home



The findings for 2022 reflect worrisome increases in stressful situations, depression and self-harm.

Increased among all grades:


- > Sexual harassment
- > Stress and depression
- > Self-harm
- > Suicide attempts

Increased particularly among 6th graders:

- > Being bullied at school
- > Self-harm
- > Stress from home



Students in 6th grade are significantly more likely to have experienced bullying compared to pre-pandemic times.




Bullied students are more likely to:

- Be cyberbullied (45%)
- Be sexually harassed (44%)
- Feel depressed (54%)

They may cope by engaging in:

- Self-harm (42%)
- Consider suicide (32%)
- Drink alcohol (18%)
- Use e-cigarettes or marijuana (13%)

Across all grades, student are more likely to report experiencing sexual harassment compared to prior years.



Sexually harassed students are more likely to:

- Be bullied (28%) cyberbullied (28%)
- Feel depressed (59%), self-harm (48%), consider suicide (32%)
- Be in the "low resilience" segment (39%)

They may cope by engaging in:


- Unhealthy dieting (29%)
- Drink alcohol (25%)
- Have sexual intercourse (21%)



Students in 6th grade and high school report higher levels of stress from academics compared to prior years. Academics is generally the largest source of stress.


Students in all grades are experiencing higher levels of stress from events and pressure at home.

Students in all grades report higher levels of depression compared to prepandemic periods.




Students experiencing depression are more likely to:

- Be bullied (24%) or cyberbullied (22%)
- Be sexually harassed (38%)
- Be in the "low resilience" segment (42%)

They may cope by engaging in:

- Self-harm (47%) or consider suicide (38%)
- Drink alcohol (18%)
- Use e-cigarettes (12%) or marijuana (14%)
- Engage in unhealthy dieting (24%)

Middle school students report alarming rates of self-harm, up significantly from pre-pandemic.




Students who self-harm are more likely to:

- Be bullied (25%) or cyberbullied (23%)
- Be sexually harassed (41%)
- Be depressed (63%) or consider suicide (42%)
- Be in the "low resilience" segment (41%)

In addition to self-harm, coping mechanisms may include:

- Drink alcohol (17%)
- Use e-cigarettes (11%) or marijuana (14%)
- Engage in unhealthy dieting (27%)


Students in all grades are more likely to carry through on suicide plans than in the past.

Students who attempted suicide are more likely to have required medical care.


However, this year also saw some substantial decreases in risky attitudes and behaviors.

Decreases noted included:

- > Stress from the pandemic
- Substance use
 - E-cigarettes
 - Marijuana
 - Alcohol
- Sending or receiving sexually explicit messages
- > Unmonitored cellphone use




Significantly fewer high school students report stress related to the pandemic than in the past, though the pandemic still causes them more stress than younger students.


While use of e-cigarettes still increases with age, use among high school students has been declining for years, and high school students are currently about a third as likely to use e-cigarettes as in the past.



Students who vape are also more likely to:

- Drink alcohol (75%)
- Use marijuana (71%)
- Have sexual intercourse (54%)
- View pornography (68%)
- Send or receive sexual messages (54%)
- Engage in unhealthy dieting (33%)
- Be in the "low resilience" segment (36%)

Like vaping, marijuana use is trending downward.




Students who use marijuana are also more likely to:

- Drink alcohol (73%)
- Use e-cigarettes (58%)
- Have sexual intercourse (51%)
- View pornography (70%)
- Send or receive sexual messages (50%)
- Engage in unhealthy dieting (32%)
- Be in the "low resilience" segment (33%)


Like vaping and marijuana use, alcohol consumption is declining, though it remains more popular among high school students.




Students who drink alcohol are also more likely to:

- Use e-cigarettes (37%) or marijuana (44%)
- Have sexual intercourse (39%)
- View pornography (59%)
- Send or receive sexual messages (39%)
- Engage in unhealthy dieting (27%)
- Be in the "low resilience" segment (26%)

High school students are also less likely to engage in sexting or find themselves in risky situations because of information they share electronically.

As in past years, certain groups are significantly more likely to engage in risky behavior.

Higher risk groups:

- > Transgender
- **➤** Non-binary
- > Racial/ethnic groups including:
 - Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander
 - American Indian or Alaska Native
 - Black or African American
 - Southeast Asian American



Students who identify as transgender or non-binary are especially vulnerable.

Increased likelihood to:

Not feel as if they belong at school 32% of transgender students 23% of non-binary students Be bullied 31% of transgender students 25% of non-binary students Be sexually harassed 39% of transgender students 40% of non-binary students Be depressed 61% of transgender students 60% of non-binary students Self-harm 56% of transgender students 54% of non-binary students Consider suicide 39% of transgender students 36% of non-binary students

These students are 2x as likely not to know where to go or who to talk to if they had a serious problem.


Over half indicate feeling depressed or engaging in self-harm.

Over a third of students considered suicide at some point in the last 12 months.



Certain racial and ethnic groups also have an increased incidence of several risk behaviors, particularly Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander students.

Those who identify as Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander have an increased likelihood to:



Other groups with higher risk behaviors:

- > American Indian or Alaska Native
- ➤ Black or African American
- > Southeast Asian American

These students are more likely not to know where to go or who to talk to if they had a serious problem.





- Among high school students, the proportion who identify as nonheterosexual has steadily increased over the past 4 years.
- Additionally, there was a slight increase this year among 6th graders.
